

Stretch Those Arms



3 months on Age

Materials A rattle

> **S**etting Bed, couch, blanket on the floor, etc.

Description Place the infant on his or her back. Shake a rattle in front of the infant about eight to 12 inches away from their nose. Shake the

rattle until the child extends his or her arms toward the rattle.

Did You Know? Infants learn through exploration. They use their eyes, mouth,

> and hands to explore large and small objects that are within their reach. Over time, actions become more purposeful and eye -hand coordination increases. Caregivers can support infants'

> exploration by providing toys and materials with a variety of textures, sounds, tastes, sizes and weights. Toys can be both manu-

factured items and household ones such as pots, pans spoons,

etc.

Movement At 6.5 months, infants can usually sit in a high chair and grasp a Milestone

dangling object.
